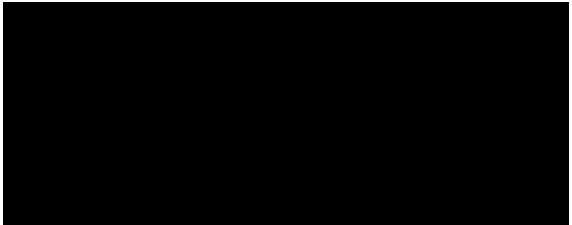
Dear Ernest Moniz,
