Dear Ernest Moniz,

While I applaud the Department of Energy's proposal to end the practice of conditionally approving liquefied natural gas (LNG) export applications before an environmental review has been conducted, more needs to be done to protect communities from the dangers to fracking and exporting LNG. I object, however, to DOE's proposal to leave analysis of the effects of fracking and other increases in gas production outside the scope of the environmental review of individual export applications. DOE's own analysis makes it clear that exports will cause additional fracking, and this fracking must be considered as part of DOE's analysis.

When it comes to evaluating LNG export facilities, please update your policies to reflect recent studies showing that the Environmental Protection Agency has drastically underestimated the amount of methane leaked during gas production.

With a full understanding of the impacts of LNG exports -- from the fracking process in the U.S. to the potential displacement of clean energy in importing countries -- a more complete understanding of how LNG exports will have on our climate is critical.
