The immense dangers from hydraulic fracturing to our water and our environments are obvious and present serious dangers to human health. In an extremely conservative estimate, over 3 trillion gallons of water, enough to cover North Carolina over 2 inches deep, will be polluted by toxic chemicals across the United States by the over 100,000 existing and permitted natural gas wells. According to industry documents, over 10,000 gallons of chemicals are injected then mixed with millions of gallons of water in each well during the fracking procedure, which is repeated numerous times with most wells.
