Dear Ernest Moniz,

The immense dangers from hydraulic fracturing to our water and our environments are obvious and present serious dangers to human health. In an extremely conservative estimate, over 3 trillion gallons of water, enough to cover North Carolina over 2 inches deep, will be polluted by toxic chemicals across the United States by the over 100,000 existing and permitted natural gas wells. According to industry documents, over 10,000 gallons of chemicals are injected then mixed with millions of gallons of water in each well during the fracking procedure, which is repeated numerous times with most wells. Many of the chemicals, while not disclosed to the public under the guise of necessary corporate secrets, are used to kill whole ecosystems of extremophiles, rich bacterial colonies that live in extreme environments below the Earth's surface.

We have little knowledge of the relationship of living systems below the Earth's surface to living systems on the surface of our planet. If these chemicals kill off enormous colonies of bacteria so the bacterial colonies do not clog the hydraulically induced fractures in the mantel of the Earth, how can the natural gas industry claim that they are safe for humans?

The alliance between corporations and our government has destroyed any semblance of democracy in America. It is the obligation of a responsible government to protect the health and safety of its people as well as the environments that sustain us.
