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Dear Ernest Moniz,

Though I appreciate the Department of Energy's proposal to end conditional approval of liquefied natural gas (LNG) export applications, DOE also needs a much better understanding of the impacts related to LNG exports and a much better plan to protect communities from the dangers of increased fracking to meet foreign demand.

DOE's own analysis makes it clear that exports will cause additional fracking, and the environmental impacts from increased fracking must be considered as part of the DOE's analysis.

When it comes to evaluating LNG export facilities, please update your analysis to reflect recent studies showing that the Environmental Protection Agency has underestimated the amount and potency methane leaked during gas production. The analysis should also include the impact of fracking on finite potable water resources as well as the fracking-induced seismic activity across the nation where fracking operations are common.

In Virginia alone, the risk of dangerous, fracking-induced seismic activity is high. You may recall the 2011 5.8 earthquake in Mineral Virginia, that damaged the Washington Monument. The quake also tossed 1.15-ton nuclear spent fuel casks around like tinker toys and shut down the reactors at the nearby North Anna Nuclear plant, which sits directly above a known earthquake fault in the Central Virginia Seismic Zone. And yet, the oil and gas industry is planning to introduce a massive natural gas fracking operation in nearby Caroline County, Virginia, which is the next county over from the site of the North Anna Nuclear plant. The federal government has known for over 50 years that high-pressure fluid injection, like fracking, can induce seismic activity even in areas without known faults or a history of seismic activity.

There are over 10,000 people living within a few miles of the nuclear

plant. And North Anna is approximately 6070 miles south of the Washington metropolitan region, which also happens to receive a lot weather coming up from the south. If an earthquake were to cause a release of nuclear material, millions of people would be at risk.

With a full understanding of the impacts of LNG exports -- from the fracking process in the U.S. to the potential displacement of clean energy in importing countries -- a more complete understanding of how LNG exports will have on our climate is critical. I ask you, as the DOE Secretary, to insist on a more comprehensive and thus a more accurate analysis of LNG production and export.

With respect to the seismic/earthquake activity in Virginia as it relates both to the North Anna Nuclear power plant and the massive natural-gas fracking operation proposed for nearby Caroline County, Virginia, I would recommend that you speak to Tim Aiken, Congressman Jim Moran's (D-VA) legislative director. Tim has a wealth of background information on this issue.

Please see out research from Pitt and Duquesne: April 14, 2014 Dear Honorable Members of Allegheny County Council, I am writing to you to express my concerns over allowing unconventional natural gas drilling under and around Allegheny County parks. As a professor at Duquesne University I have spent the last four and a half years investigating the environmental impacts of unconventional gas extraction in western Pennsylvania. I testified before the Pittsburgh City Council while it considered instituting the ban on fracking. I also served as a member of the County Executive Fitzgerald's vision team on Energy and the Environment. Most recently, I hosted a two day conference at Duquesne University this past November, "Facing the Challenges"[1], where academic researchers presented their data on the impacts of shale gas extraction. I was encouraged that some members of County Council either attended or were represented at that conference. There was a lot of information presented.

I have spoken with residents that live around Cross Creek County Pa in Washington County and seen first hand what the drilling activities ha done to the park. There have been spills, fish kills, land clearance of the wrong property, and restricted park access in addition to truck traffic and contaminated well water. The PA DEP has issued numerous violations, most recently for a spill. My own testing of residential well water has detected the presence of mixed light hydrocarbons, including methane and ethane, in several wells in Rae, a small town that lies just outside the park. Those most affected do not own mineral rights and have received no compensation and yet they live with the operations 24/7. On my flight back to Pittsburgh a few evenings ago the plane flew over Cross Creek Lake and I could see several pads lit up. More wells have been permitted. Legacy issues are a serious problem to consider. I've just completed a study of a community in Butler, and found that the extensive drilling around the community (15 well pads with 65 wells within a 2.5 mile radius) has resulted in significant deterioration of well water quality. Although the primary source of contamination, high manganese, iron, and sulfate, may be attributed to mine runoff, the fact is over 200 million gallons of fluids and 300 million pounds of proppant have been injected into the subsurface over a relatively small area. Again, the majority of affected people do not own minerals rights. Currently 30 families in this community are dependent on a volunteer water drive for their drinking water. Why this is relevant to Deer Lakes Park is that both Frazier and West Deer Townships are heavily undermined, based on PA DEP maps.[2]. Thus the risk for subsidence and mine drainage impact as a result of drilling activities (e.g., seismic surveying within the park, drilling and fracking underneath) could be significant. Is the county prepared to cover any compensation for loss of well water or surface disturbance? 1 An important bit of information unearthed by County Executive Fitzgerald's vision team was that the county does not own all the mineral rights. I'm relieved to see that County Council has passed on the idea of coal mining in South Park as the costs would outweigh any financial gain. Drilling around Deer Lakes Park could set

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precedent for allowing private minerals rights owners access and other parks, like Settlers Cabin, might not be as fortunate. One of the reasons that Pittsburgh receives accolades as a "most livable city" is its green spaces. There is too much at risk for the short-term economic gain that might be realized. The initial decline rate for Marcellus wells is 75%, meaning royalty payments are down to almost nothing after 3 years. There are alternatives to drilling the parks (my own research on bioreactors indicate that they are an economically viable source of renewable, sustainable natural gas). I am a resident of Allegheny County and live in the north hills near North Park. I hike and kayak there and appreciate being able to leave behind the rigors of the city and suburbs. I implore you not to allow drilling in or around our parks and am more than willing to meet with members of County Council to discuss my research and observations. Sincerely, John F. Stolz, PhD.
