Dear Ernest Moniz,

I wrote for an online publication covering the upstream oil and gas industry. That doesn't make me a scientist, but I have tried to keep an open mind and remain objective regarding any number of issues where the industry and the environment are seemingly in conflict. I feel confident in saying that I would not want fracking in my community. Although fracking might not cause seismic events, there is no doubt that the disposal of waste water from fracking operations does when the water is injected at high pressure back into the ground. This is particularly true when the injection sites are too close to fault lines.

That is only one of my objections to fracking operations. A more broad objection is that if the fossil fuel that has already been recovered were to all be used, without using resources yet to be recovered, it would still be enough to push global climate change well past the tipping point. We simply have to find and develop alternative energy sources.

Exporting natural gas means we have to frack more to recover more here, and that is unacceptable. I firmly stand with those who realize that communities have the right to ban fracking operations within municipal boundary lines, as the NY Court of Appeals has already ruled, and as several communities, particularly in Colorado, have already decided, often with ballot initiatives.
