Fracked gas profiteers want to squander our alleged "100-Year Supply" of gas TODAY, in hungrier international markets - converting our continental patrimony of energy reserves into cash in their own accounts... TOO BAD, for the rest of us!

At the very least, DOE should promulgate a COMPREHENSIVE environmental impact statement, accounting for the NET BURGEONING of greenhouse gas emissions liquefaction would trigger. Studies indicate that fracked wells themselves, on average, LEAK 30% of their methane, directly into the atmosphere - TRANSCENDING the greenhouse gas effects of combustion of the marketable 70%, BY ORDERS of MAGNITUDE! ...
