It involves the selling of our resources to the highest bidder on the open market with every single resource we produce. This includes, but is not limited to: our steel, our crops, our oil, our natural gas, our timber, our coal, and every other form of resource we have! Secretary Moniz, YOU have the authority to stop the madness of raping our lands and allowing the greed of those who profit by breaking the rules, doing sloppy work, using inferior materials, polluting our lands, our water, our air, and destroying the lives of ranchers and citizens who are helpless to protect themselves from the big corporations who are feeding their lust for profits over even noticing the damages they are causing. STOP IT!

This is VERY important. Especially in the Western States, the oil and gas companies are not properly monitored and gross carelessness is causing air and water pollution issues, surface water problems, ground water water table/aquifer contamination, and water shed issues. The gas companies are quietly settling out of court on numerous major health-related cases, but putting such a tight "gag order" on the plaintiffs with such massive health problems proven to have come from the drilling on, or near their property, that research and fact-finding cannot be accomplished to support the massive health problems being committed by the "energy reclamation" companies.

It's not "build it right", it's build it well enough to avoid fines or being found out for the sloppy work and poor maintenance on the sites!

Once the damage is done, no matter how big, or how small, the area affected, it's way too late! Even Prince William Sound in Alaska that was damaged by the Exon Valdez spill all those years ago, has not recovered fully. Dig down just 5-6 inches into the rocky shoreline, and you get the gunky remains from the oil spill, still there, in the same places, at the same depth in the sand, as it was after the "clean up" was declared "completed. Same with the BP rig blow-out in the Gulf of Mexico a couple years ago -- there is still gunky oil remains in the marshes and inland wetlands along the coastline! BP sites the millions they spent to clean it up. That's fine, but the job didn't get done adequately! I still won't eat ANY seafood that comes from anywhere in the entire Gulf of Mexico regions, at all! And neither will most people who actually know more about the spill, and especially the "clean-up"!!!
