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I LIVE in a fracking zone. While the activity has just started near my home, friends of mine in neighboring Washington, Greene, and Fayette Counties are sick due to exposure to airborne pollutants - including hexane, a recognized neurotoxin - from natural gas sludge pits, and compressor stations near their homes. Seizure disorders and polyneuropathy are common in these areas, as are cysts in the lungs and around the heart.

To take steps to INCREASE industrial activities in areas near the residences of American citizens, to knowingly allow an industry that is exempt from key portions of the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act, the Safe Drinking Water Act, the Right-to-Know and Superfund Act to operate literally only a few hundred feet from homes, schools, hospitals, day care centers, exhibits an attitude that is not only irresponsible and cavalier, but that points to a type of corruption in U.S. government of legendary proportions - a type of corruption hitherto attributable only to the worst of Third World governments.

We can do better than this. We, as a country, are better than this.

I fully recognize the industry pressures upon those serving in government. Even so, I am asking you to step back, remember the values and the mores with which you were raised - with which all of us were raised - and find in yourselves the courage to do the right thing - not the convenient thing, not the easy thing, but the right thing remembering that the health and the lives of countless American citizens hinges on your decisions on this issue.

Picture in your mind for a moment your own families - your aging parents, your children, your grandchildren, their beloved pets. If you would take steps to ensure that none of them lived near a natural gas extraction zone or natural gas processing or refining facilities, if you would take steps to protect them, if you would take steps to spare them the pain of watching those they love become sick and die, won't you do the same for other Americans as well? We all have names, we all have faces. We are not simply population or demographic statis We are individuals, each with rich stories and accomplishments, triumphs and griefs of our own.

Forget for one moment the back-slapping buddies who engender group think in Washington. In solitude, reflect on this matter, reflect on this decision, and do the right thing.
