I applaud the Department of Energy's proposal to end the practice of conditionally approving liquefied natural gas (LNG) export applications.

Now you are in a position to begin doing the much more that is needed to understand the impacts of allowing LNG exports. There is much to do to protect individuals and communities from the dangers of fracking for domestic consumption. There is even more to do to protect against the increased fracking to meet foreign demand. DOE's own analysis makes it clear that exports will cause additional fracking, and the environmental impacts from increased fracking must be considered as part of your analysis.

We may be willing (others may, I am not) to suffer damage from tracking if that would assure "energy security" (energy for domestic use). But to suffer damage for the sake of gas exports is another matter entirely. I am confident there is no political consensus to make the farmlands and residential ares of the U.S. a sacrifice zone to create profits for trans-national corporations that avoid U.S. taxes.

I am confident you will want to include the best information as you evaluate LNG export facilities. So you will want to update your analysis to reflect recent studies showing that the Environmental Protection Agency has underestimated the amount and potency methane leaked during gas production.

While you are at that, I urge you to consider asking Congress to remove the exemption for fracking from Clean Water and Clean Air Acts. The industry claims it is no longer experimental. They claim it can be done safely and cleanly. So there would appear to be no valid reason to retain the exemption.

A full understanding of the impacts of LNG exports will include the whole range of activities, from the fracking process in the U.S. This includes the processes at the well head as well as the cleanup or disposal of tracking fluids. It includes all the way through to the potential displacement of carbon-free clean energy in importing countries. Once you have all that information you will be in a position to have a more complete understanding of what LNG exports will do to our climate That fuller understanding is critical.
