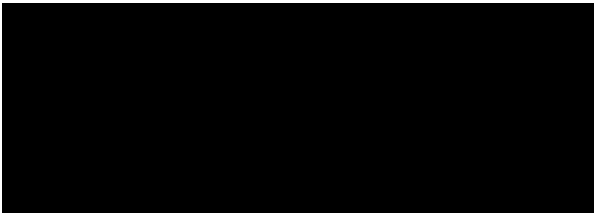


I don't want to give up my vehicle either but I do want an alternative and we are smart enough and have the money to research better alternatives to our fuel consumption.
