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To comply with NEPA, DOE must do a COMPREHENSIVE, THOROUGH analysis of ALL activities related to LNG export facilities: fracking risks to health, safety, earthquakes, toxin exposures due to pipeline leaks & transport; potential impacts on global warming, etc. Fracking already poses the most significant risk EVER to America's drinking waters (aquifers as well as ground & surface waters) due to toxins released by fracking & increased penetration of toxins into ground water aquifers as the result of fracking-caused earthquakes & fault lines in bedrock substrata. Once Ametica's drinking water supplies & aquifers are contaminated by widespread fracking, it will either be impossible to decontaminate the water, or it will be massively expensive burden on public taxpayers.
