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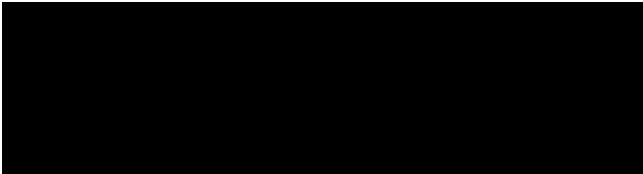

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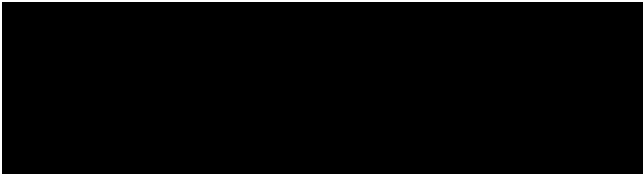

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To comply with NEPA, DOE must do a **COMPREHENSIVE, THOROUGH** analysis of ALL activities related to LNG export facilities: fracking risks to health, safety, earthquakes, toxin exposures due to pipeline leaks & transport; potential impacts on global warming, etc. Fracking already poses the most significant risk **EVER** to America's drinking waters (aquifers as well as ground & surface waters) due to toxins released by fracking & increased penetration of toxins into ground water aquifers as the result of fracking-caused earthquakes & fault lines in bedrock substrata. Once America's drinking water supplies & aquifers are contaminated by widespread fracking, it will either be impossible to decontaminate the water, or it will be massively expensive burden on public taxpayers. DOE also must consider 2 other **DIRECT** adverse impacts of increased fracking resulting from approval of LNG EXPORTS & facilities: (1) destruction of significant portions of America's organic & non-organic farming/food production areas; (2) long term increase in toxic illness & healthcare costs. **ORGANIC** farming impacts: there is significant overlap of fracking shale beds with America's animal & plant agriculture farm lands. Increased fracking will result in significant threat to these agricultural lands from fracking air, land, & water upon which American ag depends. There also is extensive overlap with **ORGANIC** animal & plant production in America. Once these lands become polluted by fracking wastes, they will no longer qualify as "organic" & America will lose hundreds of millions \$ from our economy. Increased fracking & LNG export also is **INCOMPATIBLE** with President Obama's policies promoting long term **PREVENTIVE** healthcare to reduce American healthcare costs. Loading up America's air, land & drinking water with fracking toxic chemicals is **ANTI-THETICAL TO THE PRESIDENT'S** policies of **PREVENTIVE HEALTHCARE**.
