Jordan Cove proposed export terminal and Pacific Connector gas pipeline in Southern Oregon needs to be withdrawn from the conditionally approved list.

I am an affected landowner of PCGP - a Williams Company proposal. As you know, Wiliam's Company has an atrocious safety record with two recent explosions in Opal, WY and Plymouth, WA.

As a former permit processor for San Diego CNTY Air Pollution Control District I have witnessed many negligent practices in industry. I have also helped shutter some.

Now we have a scenario of a 36 inch extremely high pressure natural gas pipe planned to go under the Rogue River at 800 feet from a gasoline service site and a half mile radius from populations in the town of Trail, Oregon and 1.1 mile from the City of Shady Cove, Oregon. Never mind the pipe buried a mere 18 inches in forested rural area and rugged, steep terrain next to my new passive solar home. We had over 10,000 lightening strikes in my area last summer and five mega wildfires. The closest burned 12 miles away.
