While I applaud the Department of Energy's proposal to end the practice of conditionally approving liquefied natural gas (LNG) export applications, much more is needed to understand the impacts of allowing LNG exports and to protect communities from the dangers of increased fracking to meet foreign demand. DOE's own analysis makes it clear that exports will cause additional fracking, and the environmental impacts from increased fracking must be considered as part of your analysis.

When it comes to evaluating LNG export facilities, please update your analysis to reflect recent studies showing that the Environmental Protection Agency has underestimated the amount and potency methane leaked during gas production.

Although I understand the Department of Energy's proposal to end the conditional approval of Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) export applications, much more is needed to deal with this problem that the Obama administration is promoting.

DOE's own analysis makes it clear that exports will cause additional fracking, a dangerous method of gas extraction which is not being adequately regulated at either state or federal levels. The quake also bounced around 1.15-ton nuclear spent fuel casks and shut down the reactors at the nearby North Anna Nuclear plant, which sits directly above a known earthquake fault in the Central Virginia Seismic Zone.
