DOE's own analysis makes it clear that exports will cause additional fracking, and the environmental impacts from increased fracking must be considered as part of your analysis.

In particular, when it comes to evaluating LNG export facilities, it is time to update your analysis to reflect recent studies showing that the Environmental Protection Agency has underestimated the amount and potency methane leaked during gas production.

Moreover, cheap LNG exports will also displace investment in and demand for clean energy in the importing countries.

Would you agree to something life changing before you knew all of the details? For years, your Department has been doing just that when it comes to fracked gas exports. They call it "conditional approval," meaning a liquefied natural gas export facility is approved to move forward without knowing the environmental impacts to our communities, air, water, climate and coasts.

The DOE is considering changes to this process and may stop issuing these conditional approvals. While this is a step in the right direction, there is still more work to be done. The DOE is still planning to review export projects without looking at the environmental impacts of the additional fracking gas that exports will inevitably cause. The DOE needs to look at the whole picture. Before any decision is made, please put the health and safety of our communities before the interests of companies looking to profit from fracked gas exports.

This means the DOE must account for everything, from fracked wells to transport through pipelines across the country to building giant export terminals along our coasts.
