I applaud the Department of Energy's proposal to end the practice of conditionally approving liquefied natural gas (LNG) export applications. Thank you. Still, much more should be done to understand the impacts of allowing LNG exports and to protect communities from the dangers of increased fracking to meet foreign demand.

DOE's own analysis makes it clear that exports will cause additional fracking, and the environmental impacts from increased fracking must be considered as part of your analysis.

Fracking is dangerous to the health of our ground water and all of us who depend on this precious resource- our water. It also risks the private water wells of thousands who depend on them. It is very water wasteful too. We cannot underestimate the folly of using up, and polluting our limited, precious water supplies in this way, during a time of prolonged and possibly permanent drought conditons. Practices like fracking in the O & G industry are contributing to climate change.

When it comes to evaluating LNG export facilities, please update your analysis to reflect recent studies showing that the Environmental Protection Agency has underestimated the amount and potency of methane, not to mention the toxic stew of other, very poisonous chemicals that are used, and leaked during gas production. Chemicals that the industry refuses to disclose.

There was a nurse in my town who worked on a man that was severely sickened, although wearing a haz mat suit, while working on fracking in the O & G fields, and came to our hospital. No one would give the health care professionals any information about what chemicals they were dealing with in trying to save this man's life. This nurse became severely ill herself and has never recovered. Just one example of how dangerous and dubious this practice is.

With a full understanding of the impacts of LNG exports -- from the fracking process in the U.S. to the potential displacement of clean energy in importing countries -- a more complete understanding of the impacts LNG exports will have on our climate is critical. It's beyond time to move away from O & G production and commit to supporting renewable energy and conservation. No more fracking!
