While I applaud the Department of Energy's proposal to end the practice of conditionally approving liquefied natural gas (LNG) export applications, much more is needed to understand the impacts of allowing LNG exports and to protect communities from the dangers of increased fracking to meet foreign demand. DOE's own analysis makes it clear that exports will cause additional fracking, and the environmental impacts from increased fracking must be considered as part of your analysis. Instances of surface and ground water contamination from fracking are increasing and new pipelines to carry the gas to the coast will cross miles of sensitive habitats and streams on public and private lands.

When it comes to evaluating LNG export facilities, please update your analysis to reflect recent studies showing that the Environmental Protection Agency has underestimated the amount and potency of methane leaked during gas production. When methane vented at production areas, air pollution produced to pump and liquefy the natural gas and shipping emissions are all accounted for, the impact on greenhouse gas levels will be worse for exporting American fracked gas than for using or exporting coal.

Proposed export terminals such as Cove Point, Maryland will have major environmental impacts which have not been adequately identified.
