Intellectual Property Rights

Granted by governments
Earned by virtue of the nature of the property



Intellectual Property

- Tangible or intangible
- Results from created thought and intellectual human efforts
- Idea, expression, invention, design, unique name, business method, technology transfer, industrial process



Patent Rights

- Granted for a limited time to creators by the government
- Purpose to promote innovation
- Geographically limited to the country granting patent protection
- Compliance with international treaty regulations



Patentable Subjects

Vary from country to country

- a patent granted in one country may not be eligible for patent protection in another country
- Duration of patent protection
- Separate applications in each country required
- First-to-file priority system



Copyright

- Limited right of protection to authors for original works
- Protects authors' method of expressing an idea, but not the idea itself
- Encourages creation and dissemination of creative works to the public



International Copyright

Does not yet exist

International treaties protect foreign works

Owner has exclusive right to reproduce the work



Trademark Rights

Protect goodwill built up by a business

- Protected as a trade or service mark if distinctive
- Based on a system of territoriality
- Different rules and requirements regarding registration in each country



Trademark Rights

- Most countries permit registration of a mark prior to actual use
- Allow owner to preserve the right to use the mark before actual expansion of business
- Other countries:
 - Require the business to use the mark in commerce
 - Establish the mark as a source indicator within the territory prior to gaining protection
 - Rights preserved as long as the mark is not abandoned



Trade Secret Protection

- Oldest method for protecting creative works
- Common law protection
- Not uniformly protected around the world
- Once disclosed to the public, protection ceases



Challenges and Opportunities for International Cooperation to Solve Problems

- Customization of intellectual property protection to meet specific needs
- Protection of intellectual property rights
- Prevent design around
- Best suited property rights for protection
- International cooperation to share and protect technology
- Solving problems with intellectual property barriers
