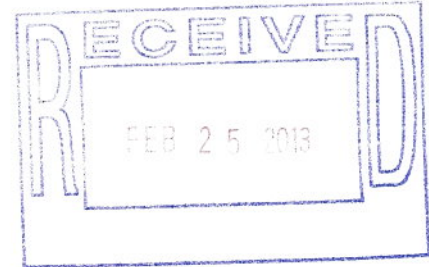


Dear Secretary Chu-
