PIOGA is a nonprofit trade association, with nearly 1000 members, representing Pennsylvania independent oil and natural gas producers, marketers, service companies and related businesses, landowners and royalty owners.

PIOGA is in support of the Department of Energy moving forward with the approval of all pending liquefied natural gas (LNG) export applications for non-free trade agreement countries.

The development of the Marcellus Shale and other unconventional shale formations has allowed natural gas to become an important component of America's energy supply and economic health. The United States is once again on the global platform for energy development.

This important development has led to unprecedented growth in Pennsylvania in regard to private sector job creation and economic impact for our state and the citizens of our Commonwealth.
